State	Bill No.	Explanation	Status
<b>Hawaii</b>	<a href="#">HB 99/SB 364</a>	Allows cow-sharing, direct-to-consumer and retail sale of raw milk and raw milk products with label stating "contains pathogens which may be unsafe to consume."	<a href="#">Pending: House Health Committee/Senate Agriculture Committee</a>
<b>Indiana</b>	<a href="#">SB 513</a>	Allows direct-to-consumer sales of raw cow's milk only if the producer has a permit and complies with sanitation, sampling, testing and labeling requirements.	<a href="#">Pending: Senate Agriculture and Natural Resources Committee</a>
<b>Indiana</b>	<a href="#">SB 610</a>	Allows individuals to obtain raw milk through herd shares.	<a href="#">Pending: Senate Health and Provider Services Committee</a>
<b>Iowa</b>	<a href="#">SF 61</a>	Suspends enforcement of laws and regulations affecting the sale of unprocessed food, including milk.	Died In Committee
<b>Iowa</b>	<a href="#">SF 77</a>	Allows direct-to-consumer sales of raw milk and dairy products made from raw milk	Died In Committee
<b>Iowa</b>	<a href="#">HSB 131</a>	Study of allowing raw milk retail sales	Died In Committee
<b>Kansas</b>	<a href="#">SB 146</a>	Expands the definition of permitted on-farm raw milk sales to include milk delivered by the producer to the consumer	<a href="#">Pending: Senate Agriculture Committee</a>
<b>Massachusetts</b>	<a href="#">HB 717</a>	In addition to currently allowed on-farm raw milk sales, allows farmers to sell raw milk directly to consumers off the farm under a contract	<a href="#">Pending: Joint Environment, Natural Resources and Agriculture Committee</a>
<b>Massachusetts</b>	<a href="#">HB 782</a>	Allows cow-shares in allowed on-farm raw milk sales	<a href="#">Pending: Joint Environment, Natural Resources and Agriculture Committee</a>
<b>Mississippi</b>	<a href="#">HB 948</a>	Keeps counties or municipalities from regulating sales of unprocessed agricultural products directly from the farmer to the consumer	Dead in committee

State	Bill No.	Explanation	Status
<b>Montana</b>	<a href="#">HB 574</a>	Allows on-farm sales of raw milk and raw milk products for farmers with less than 15 cows; requires permits and testing; also allows milk plants to sell raw milk directly to consumers from the plant	
<b>New Mexico</b>	<a href="#">SB 286</a>	Bans retail sales of raw milk, which are legal in New Mexico.	<a href="#">Pending: Senate Conservation Committee</a>
<b>Oklahoma</b>	<a href="#">HB 1541</a>	Expands raw milk sales to include delivery by farmers directly to consumers in addition to on-farm sales.	<a href="#">Pending: House Agriculture and Wildlife Committee</a>
<b>Rhode Island</b>	<a href="#">SB 15</a>	Allows raw milk sales by licensed producers.	Committee recommended measure be held for further study
<b>Texas</b>	<a href="#">HB 46</a>	Expands direct-to-consumer raw milk sales from on-farm only to include farmers' markets, farm stands and county fairs; permits and labels required.	Dead in committee
<b>Vermont</b>	SB 70	Expands raw milk sales to include farmers markets in addition to on-farm sales	<a href="#">Pending: Senate Agriculture Committee</a>
<b>Wyoming</b>	<a href="#">SF 112</a>	Allows raw milk by farms of no more than three cows with a state permit; milk must meet all safety regulations others than those for pasteurization; sales barred to restaurants; milk must include a state-approved label if sold away from the farm	Dead in committee
